

# Youth Mentoring Remains Strong in 2020

The year 2020 has brought us a vast array of obstacles and challenges. Despite it all, communities have come together to love, support and encourage one another through these difficult times. This remains steadfast: lowans care.

Youth Mentoring at Helping Services has taken on new form, but the substance remains the same. One of our Mentoring Coordinators, Meg Gelner, was encouraged after speaking with one of our Mentors who has remained active with her mentee through most of the COVID season. Patty VanMeter, of Manchester, has been a mentor with our program since February of 2019. Before the corona virus was sweeping the nation, her and her mentee, Kassie, would meet regularly as a community-based match. They loved to shop, do crafts, get their nails done and just spend quality time together. During the time when Helping Services brought all of our mentoring matches to a mandatory hault, Patty stayed in touch with Kassie by texting and making phone calls.

These times have been challenging for adults, but we cannot overlook the needs of our lowa youth. When asked what she felt kids needed the most during this time, Patty stated, "I think kids need to be encouraged to talk about how they feel."

Patty and Kassie have resumed their mentoring relationship and have made changes to their activities to accommodate safety suggestions." We have to find new ways of doing old things," Patty said. "Instead of going to a nail salon, we can set up at a table and maintain a safe distance."

Helping Services understands that not everyone is comfortable with meeting face to face at this time. We would like to encourage all mentors to continue to reach out to their mentee whether that be through text, phone call, email, or hand written letters. We will get through this together and we will come out stronger on the other end...lowa Strong!

*In June*, some mentors and mentees began meeting in-person with precautions in place including face coverings, social distancing, and recommendations to meet outside when possible. Other matches are staying connected by writing letters, phone calling, texting and/or video chatting. Youth Mentoring is supportive of how each individual match chooses to meet. During this unusual time, recruitment efforts for new mentors have continued. Mentors are needed for our waiting youth.

Youth Mentoring is excited to announce that they are one of 11 recipients in the state of lowa to receive an Improving Tomorrow: Prevention Focused Mentoring grant from the lowa Department of Public Health. The grant has four exciting goals. *They are:* 

- Support 91 mentoring matches in our four counties.
- Substance abuse prevention and problem gambling trainings will be offered as well as distributing materials on these topics.
- Our Steering Committees will support the behind the scenes work.
- A sustainability plan will help us financially.

This funding source will support some salaries, events, trainings, mileage, recruitment materials, phone, and computer needs.



# Welcomes a New Grant to Support Victims Helping Services was notified in September that we will be

Helping Services was notified in September that we will be receiving a grant from the Department of Justice Office on Violence Against Women (OVW) for funding under the OVW FY 2020 Rural Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, and Stalking Program. Under the guidelines of this grant, the program is designed to enhance victim safety in cases of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking in rural areas by encouraging collaborative partnerships among criminal justice agencies, victim service providers, and community organizations to respond to these crimes. This is a 3-year grant starting on October 1 that will allow Helping Services' Domestic Abuse Resource Center to expand its team by two advocates.
