# Youth Mentoring Partners with Northeast Iowa Peace and Justice Center

This year the Youth Mentoring program partnered with the Immigration Working Group out of the Northeast Iowa Peace and Justice Center to bring mentoring to local immigrant youth. Five youth and their families signed up for mentoring and were matched with an adult friend to be their mentor. The matches have been going on hikes, watching movies at the theater, reading books at the library, learning about art, eating some Whippy Dip, playing games, and having all kinds of new experiences.

Youth Mentoring, through the support of the lowa Mentoring Partnership, is thrilled to have made this partnership with the Immigration Working Group. Mentoring Coordinator Colinne McCann states, "When I get the reports from the mentors on the times they are having with their youth, it warms my heart to hear the experiences and opportunities the immigrant youth are getting that they might not otherwise have. It is so exciting to see mentoring making an impact on the lives of youth as well as the mentors lives."

#### **Youth Mentoring FY19 Stats**

Youth Mentoring has five program goals that it aspires to achieve. Surveys that are completed in the fall and spring help us see where youth are at in their growth toward these goals. Here are the results for FY19:

Youth Mentoring strives to achieve five important goals. The findings for mentees are:

98% of mentored youth are able to say no to drugs

**91%** have positive relationships with their peers and other caring adults

89% are hopeful about their future

86% feel good about themselves most of the time

79% have a good attitude about school

So, what do those terms really mean?




**Domestic Abuse Resource Center:** A team of certified advocates is available to provide options and resources for individuals who identify as victims of domestic abuse. Services are 100% voluntary and client-driven. A Resource Line (1-800-383-2988) is available 24/7 for those seeking services. Counties served include Allamakee, Bremer, Chickasaw, Clayton, Fayette, Howard, and Winneshiek.

**Family Education & Support:** A group of trained in-home educators utilize the Parents as Teachers curriculum to work with parents of children age 0-3 years old on child development benchmarks. Services also include free parenting workshops for anyone seeking options. Counties served include Allamakee, Clayton, Howard, and Winneshiek.

**Substance Use Prevention:** Our Certified Prevention Specialists at Helping Services encourage youth and adults to make healthy choices surrounding alcohol and other drugs. Counties served include Allamakee, Clayton, Delaware, Fayette, Howard, and Winneshiek.

**Youth Mentoring:** Mentoring Coordinators pair youth age 6–16 with an adult role-model. Counties served include Allamakee, Delaware, Howard and Winneshiek.



#### **FY 2019 FINANCIAL OVERVIEW**






#### **FY 2019 OPERATING REVENUE = \$1,759,529**

#### Did You Know?

Based on audited numbers from Fiscal Year 2018, Helping Services allocated **85%** of total expenses directly to Program costs.

That means only **15%** of expenses were utilized for Management and Fundraising costs.

#### Helping Services Offers Workshops and Resources

Helping Services offers workshops and resources throughout the year for parents, caregivers and anyone involved in working with children. The Nurtured Heart Approach workshop is one such resource, which focuses of building healthy, positive relationships between adults and children.

#### Those attending the workshops learn tools such as:

- How to set boundaries and limits that empower your child
- Say "No" to your child and have them accept this response
- Celebrate your child's behavior in a real and authentic way

A light meal and free childcare is provided at each session. Families who complete all three sessions will receive a gas card and a set of children's books and activities to take home with them. #### **Youth Leadership Day**

The annual Youth Leadership Day was held at Camp EWALU in October. Over thirty high school students from northeast lowa attended the Youth Leadership Day, with work throughout the day focused on projects in their school and community. Staff provided interactive education on a few topics that students requested including vaping, marijuana and alcohol. A common theme is that many of the youth are concerned about students their age and younger who are vaping. Students also spent time on the low-ropes course with team building activities and each left with a plan of action for the upcoming year.

Throughout the year Prevention staff work with youth in local schools including Cresco, Decorah, Edgewood-Colesburg, Maquoketa Valley, Riceville, South Winneshiek, Turkey Valley, Waukon, West Central, and West Delaware.

## School Based Mentoring Seeks Mentors

Youth in *Decorah Community (John Cline Elementary)*, *West Delaware*, *Maquoketa Valley*, and *Edgewood Colesburg School Districts* are seeking mentors this year. We hope you will consider mentoring a local youth this year. There are two types of school based mentoring:

**School-Based Mentoring Services** – Volunteers age 16+ are matched with a youth in grades K-12 for a minimum of one school year. The volunteer meets with the student for 45 minutes to one hour each week. These matches meet during the school day on the school grounds. Each match meets one designated day per week, every week, during the school year. Location options to meet include; available classrooms, cafeteria, gym, quiet hallways, school stage, guidance counselor office or on the playground.

**After-School Program** — Volunteer high school students, grades 10th through 12th are matched with a child between the ages of 7 to 13, for one hour (1:30 – 2:30 PM), one designated day per week after school. The match is a one year commitment. Activities the match might do together are; play provided board games, work on a craft together, work on a challenging subject or school assignment the mentee has, or play on the playground.
